Volunteer this Christmas

There are many charities in Oxford who provide services for those in need over the festive period. Often these charities will look for volunteers to help on Christmas Day to provide Christmas Dinner to people who may be homeless, or in need of support. Below is some information on charities seeking volunteers for Christmas activities:

Oxford Christmas Lunch - 'Attendees include refugees from war, the elderly, those in food poverty or simply those who'd rather not celebrate Christmas alone.' Details on how to volunteer can be found on their_facebook page here.

Crisis (Oxford) - 'Every Christmas, local volunteers come together to provide warmth, companionship and vital services to our members (people experiencing homelessness) at one of the toughest times of the year.' You can sign up to volunteer via <u>the 'Crisis Oxford' website here</u>.

FESTIVE INFORMATION

Christmas Eve: 24 December

Christmas Eve is not a public holiday in the UK, but usually people don't work a full day because they need to travel to their families. Public transport services may finish earlier than usual.

Christmas Day: 25 December

This is a public holiday in the UK. Most shops, restaurants and places of entertainment will be closed on Christmas Day.

Boxing Day: 26 December

This is a public holiday in the UK. Most transport services are usually running, but they often have a reduced service and may start later in the day than normal. Retail shops are usually open on Boxing Day and begin their 'Boxing Day sales' where lots of products and items will be heavily discounted.

Christmas Carols

It is often tradition to attend a Christmas Carol Service or Concert in the UK. Carol services are usually held in a church and everyone sings Christmas Carols (you can choose if you want to join in with the singing or not!). There are lots of concerts or church services across Oxford throughout December and all are welcome to attend. Brookes are holding their annual Carol Service on Tuesday 17 December at 12.05pm in Westminster Chapel at Harcourt Hill Campus. Christ Church in Oxford city centre has a number of Christmas events that you might be interested in. You'll find more information on the <u>Church Church webpage here</u>. What do people do on Christmas Day?

Lots of families celebrate Christmas with their own customs and traditions and many Christians start the day by going to Church. Typically people exchange gifts, enjoy a festive drink, pull crackers and eat a big Christmas dinner with some or all of the following: roast turkey, roast potatoes, root vegetables, brussel sprouts, bread sauce and 'pigs in blankets'. After this, the evening is spent playing board games or watching Christmas shows on the television.

Brookes

- *Campus:* Access to buildings changes and the Brookes website has <u>information about campus</u> <u>access and opening times over the festive period</u>.
- *University libraries:* The library will be closed from 25 December 2024 to 1st January 2025. They will close early on 24 December. <u>Library opening times are on the website</u>.
- *Brookes Sport:* Headington and Harcourt Sport Centres will be closed from 24 December to 27 December and again from 31 December to 1 January 2025.
- *Catering outlets:* Many of the catering outlets across all campuses will have varied opening hours over the vacation period. <u>The Catering webpage has full details</u>.
- *Brookes Security:* If you need immediate assistance on or around campus, please contact Oxford Brookes Security Services via its new number of 01865 60 3060. This number is available 24 hours a day, 365 days a year with <u>further information available on the Security webpages</u>.
- BROOKESBus: please check the Oxford Bus Company website or app for details on your bus routes during the vacation period as bus services will be affected.

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Other Services

- Brookes Medical Centre will be closed during the holiday. If you need medical assistance you should call 111 for advice or 999 in an emergency.
